



2024 MVR Elections

At the January board meeting the current election process and cost was discussed. Of the 120 ballots and envelopes mailed out postage paid, only 32 were returned.




MVR member John Brewer notes this engine has individual jugs and overhead valves. Can anyone help identify the car?

Upcoming MVR Events

On Sunday, March 24th at 2:00 PM, the German American Heritage Center (712 W 2nd St, Davenport, IA 52802) will host a presentation by Mike Flaherty on the making of the first automobile atlas of Iowa by local Davenport cartographer Melchoir Huebinger.

Huebinger arrived as a German immigrant to Davenport in 1880 to work as a surveyor and cartographer for the Army Corps of Engineers in Rock Island. He published his first local atlas of Scott County in 1882, and later produced hundreds of local maps and atlases in his downtown Davenport shop until 1910, when he moved to Des Moines to coordinate the first ever automobile road atlas of Iowa. Mike Flaherty will present a history of Huebinger's central role in the development of modern maps of Davenport, culminating in the production of the first automobile atlas of the state of Iowa in 1912. Huebinger's career covered the transition from horse and buggy Victorian maps to modern 20th century automobile map production and is a fascinating look into how maps were made at the turn of the last century.



The presentation will include dozens of local maps, guide books and atlases produced by Huebinger's companies between 1882 and 1926 from Mr Flaherty's collection.

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1973-78 Antique GMC Motorhome



Jan has a 23' GMC Motorhome and though we did not attend this last year, 80 of them were at the M1 Concourse skid pad in Pontiac, Michigan to mark the 50th anniversary where they were built.

The GMC Motorhome was designed in 23' and 26' versions using the Tornado front drive package (Unitized Power Package). Without a rear driveshaft the floor came in at 14" above the road. Rear air suspension featured 2 bogie wheels in tandem giving more interior room than duals. With overall center of gravity low, plus torsion front suspension coupled with wide rear suspension, drivers found the motorhome handling more like a sports car as can be seen on GM handling tests found on You-tube.

Production started in 1973 in Plant #3 on two levels. Upper level was body build with body panels adhesively boded to the trussed aluminum frame. Lower level built the chassis and where then the body was joined. In total 12,921 were produced with an estimated 8,500 still on the road today.

The Old Gas Station Page




