

In 1997 I was visiting with a fellow John Deere tractor col-lector, Charlie Sharp, from Chase, Kansas about my desire to purchase an early touring car. Charlie told me that since I was a John Deere collector I should purchase a Velie car. He had two Velie cars in his collection, a 1922 model 58 sport touring, and a 1925 model 60 sedan parts car. Charlie gave me Bob Nelson's contact information, so I got ahold of him and he told me of a couple of Velies for sale, how-ever, they were sedans and I was looking for a touring car. I subscribed to the Velie Newsletter and soon there was a 1918 model 38 touring car listed for sale by Fred Brand in Frontinac, Kansas. It was just what I was looking for and not that far from home. Fred had restored the car in the 1960's and driven it extensively on tours for a number of years but it had been setting in his shed for about 10 years and it was time for him to sell. I purchased the car and went to southeast Kansas and trailered it home.

At that time Velie owners were meeting at the annual Chickasha, Oklahoma, swap meet. I started attending this and got acquainted with Bob Nelson and Chuck Hoaglund as well as many other Velie owners. My interest in collect-ng, driving, and showing early cars grew rapidly. In 1998 I purchased a John Deere tractor in Portland, OR and decided to purchase a 1928 6-66 sedan and 1927 model 60 slant-windshield sedan in Washington. I made a trip to pick up my purchases and visit with other Velie owners. On this trip I visited Martin Mueller who owned the first Velie, Old Maud. He said that he was possibly considering selling her but the price was a bit out of my reach at that time.

A couple years later I was able to make a deal to purchase Maud, so, my wife and I made another trip to Portland to pick her up. I was getting serious into collecting Velie cars.

I continued to add to my collection and then saw that it might be possible to obtain one of each year of Velie auto-mobile produced. In 2016 I achieved this goal. I do not have a 1916 modelyear Velie but none of these exist. When I moved to Grand Island, NE, in 2020 I purchased a commercial building that was previously a 32-lane bowling center with the idea of displaying my car collection there. In the process of developing the property into housing lots I created a plan to remodel the building into an event center with a portion of the facility to be used as a car museum. The current economy has created major delays in the housing development and caused me to abandon my plans for the event center/car museum. This has forced me to evaluate what to do with my car collection leading to the decision to significantly reduce my collection and get down to a more manageable number of cars. I will be keeping Maud and the cars that I am actively touring with as well as a lot of project cars that I will continue to work on. I will be selling a large portion of my collection of Velie literature and memorabilia. The time is right for me to pass these items onto their next caretakers. I have thoroughly enjoyed putting this collection together and am also excited to see things be passed on to others that will actively enjoy ownership. I will continue to manage the Velie Registry and produce the Velie Newsletter. I have an extensive collection of information that was begun by Bob Nelson, Chuck Hoaglund, and







A Chevy Truck Story

Some of you may be wondering why you haven't seen my 1952 Chevrolet pickup since the Fall Drive in 2022. When I bought that truck out of the front of a farm field twenty years ago, I was able to get the engine running. The block sported a rebuilt tag from a

company identifying it had been bored .40 over and converted from babbitt bearings to inserts.


As the years went by it became harder to start the truck. The engine began burning more oil and had below spec oil pressure. So in the fall of 2023 I decided it was time to refresh the engine. And that started a series of events.


MVR member Eric Smith was hired to pull the engine and get it to a shop. Eric accomplished that promptly. *And then things got worse*. The shop reported a cracked head. *And then things got worse*. We found the cylinders had no cross-hatch left, confirming the source of the oil consumption. *And then things got worse*. The cylinders were badly coned out, and with the holes having previously been bored .40 over, left not enough block material to bore again.

We discussed sleeving the cylinders... Then I had an idea. When I restored that truck I was dealing with it being a one-ton which is not frequently chosen for restoration and thus few parts sources. Fortunately I'd found Tom Myers Truck Parts in Miami, Oklahoma.

Tom had been collecting Advanced Design and later Chevrolet trucks since the early 1970s and he had a ready supply of parts for 1/2 ton, 3/4 ton and 1 ton vehicles both Chevrolet and GMC. From Tom I was able to get five of the original 17 inch split rims, the correct chrome hubcaps to fit those wheels, an outside cab visor and an original defrost control cable and mounting bracket.

I called Tom and learned that he had recently had a couple of sales and the yard wasn't what it used to be. He still had some engines though so I gave him the block casting numbers for a 216







Plans were set and I made the eight hour trek to Miami, Oklahoma.

At 8AM I arrived to get my "new" engine. Besides the trucks, the first thing I noticed was a black cat climbing across the tops of stacked parts.

After the engine was checked out, Tom Myers took me on a historic tour. While we were driving a customer form Florida called asking questions about an electrical problem on his late fifties Chevy truck. Tom diagnosed it over the phone solidifying my opinion of his expertise.

Later before I left representatives from Jim Carter Truck Parts came for parts. Tom is truly a significant resource in the Chevy Truck World.
