HENRY FORD

Although I've owned my 1939 Empire Green LaSalle 5019-A only a short time, if the truth were known, I have been a "car guy" for a long time. I first got the "bug" when I was a child growing up in Toledo, Ohio (which some consider a suburb of the Motor City). I can trace my love for old cars

back to a day in the early 1970s when my mom and dad took me to visit The Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village in Dearborn, Michigan, which was only about an hour from home. That was the day that I got my first ride in a Model T Ford! I've dreamed of owning an antique car since that day.

I remember checking out car books and magazines at the local library, and looking in the classified ads in the paper just to see what was

available and what sorts of prices the hobby would require. But it was just a pipe dream for this pre-teen! I also remember reading Tad Burness' Auto Album feature in the newspaper regularly! (Does anyone remember that?) The family car was, of course, a station wadon. We had a 1962 Ford Country Sedan. Another thrill was getting a factory tour of the Clark Street Cadillac plant back in '73 (I was 13 years old at the time!). Over time I gravitated away from Fords, and toward General Motors, but I'll never forget my first ride in a Model T Ford!

And so it seems only right that I spend some time this month discussing the work of the great American industrialist, Henry Ford and his contribution to the automotive industry!

Henry Ford was born on July 30, 1863 and is perhaps best know for the development of the assembly line system of mass production. Truth be known, Henry Ford invented neither the automobile nor the assembly line, but he did develop and manufactured the first automobile that many middle class Americans could afford! In doing so, Ford transformed the automobile from an expensive curiosity into a practical conveyance that would greatly impact the landscape of the 20th Century. His introduction of the Model T revolutionized transportation and American industry.

> As the owner of the Ford Motor Company, he became one of the richest and best-known people in the world. He is credited with advancing mass production of inexpensive goods coupled with high wages for workers. His intense commitment to methodically lowering costs resulted in many technical and business innovations, including a franchise system that put dealerships throughout most of

North America and in major cities on six continents. Ford left most of his vast wealth to the Ford Foundation and arranged for his family to

control the company permanently.

In 1891, Ford became an engineer with the Edison illuminating Company. After his promotion to Chief Engineer in 1893, he had enough time and money to devote attention to his personal experiments on gasoline engines. These experiments concluded in 1896 with the completion of a selfpropelled vehicle, which he named the Ford Quadricycle. He testdrove it on June 4. After various test drives, Ford devised ways to improve the Quadricycle.

In 1896, Ford attended a meeting of Edison executives, where he was met Thomas Edison. Edison approved of Ford's automobile

experimentation and encouraged Ford to design and built a second vehicle, completing it in 1898. Backed by the capital of Detroit lumber baron William H. Murphy, Ford resigned from the Edison Company and founded the Detroit Automobile Company on August 5, 1899. However, the automobiles produced were of a lower quality and higher price than Ford wanted. Ultimately, the company was not successful and was dissolved in January 1901.



With the help of C. Harold Wills, Ford designed, built, and successfully raced a 26-horsepower automobile in October 1901. With this success,

Murphy and other stockholders in the **Detroit Automobile** Company formed the Henry Ford Company on November 30, 1901, with Ford as chief engineer. In 1902, Murphy brought in Henry M. Leland as a consultant. Ford, in response, left the company bearing his name. With Ford gone.



Murphy renamed the company the Cadillac Automobile Company.



Teaming up with former racing cyclist Tom Cooper. Ford also produced the 80+ horsepower racer "999" which Barney Oldfield was to drive to victory in a race in October 1902. Ford received the backing of an old acquaintance, Alexander Y. Malcomson, a Detroit-area coal dealer. They formed the partnership, "Ford & Malcomson, Ltd." to manufacture automobiles. Ford went to work designing an inexpensive automobile, and they leased a factory and contracted with a machine shop owned by John and Horace F. Dodge to supply over \$160,000 in parts. Sales were slow,

1903, with \$28,000 capital. The original investors included Ford and Malcomson, the Dodge brothers. Malcomson's uncle John S. Gray, Malcolinson's secretary James Couzens, and two of Malcomson's lawyers, John W. Anderson and Horace Rackham. Ford then demonstrated a newly designed car on the ice of Lake St Clair, driving 1 mile in 39.4 seconds and setting a new land speed record at 91.3 miles per hour. Convinced by this success, the race driver

Barney Oldfield, who named this new Ford model "999" in honor of the fastest locomotive of the day, took the car around the country, making the Ford brand known throughout the United States. Ford also was one of the early backers of the Indianapolis 500.



Ford died of a cerebral hemorrhage on April 7, 1947, at the age of 83, near his Dearborn estate, Fair Lane. His legacy will live on for decades to come.
