Franklin Bell


Franklin D. Bell, 78, of Milan, passed away at his home on Tuesday, July 28, 2015. Visitation was Sunday, Aug. 2 at Wendt Funeral Home in Moline. Services were on Monday, Aug. 3, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, 2810 5th Ave., Rock Island. Burial will be at Rock Island National Cemetery on Arsenal Island. Memorials may be made to Sacred Heart Church, Rock Island, or the Rock Island Evening Lions Club.

Franklin Delano Bell was born in Savanna, Ill., on Jan. 3, 1937, to Henry J. and Estella E. Farrell Bell. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, having served at Fort Carson, Colo., as part of a USAR control training group.

He graduated from Savanna High School and St. Ambrose College in Davenport. He was a certified life underwriter for Metropolitan Life Company. He was a member of Rock Island's Sacred Heart Church, a life-member of Rock Island Evening Lions Club and a member and past-president of Metropolitan Life Veterans Association. After retiring from Metropolitan, Franklin served 12 and a half years as executive director of Rock Island Clean and Beautiful. He was a member and past-president of AACAA/Mississippi Valley Antique Automobile Club of America and a member of the NRA.

Franklin married Constance Bower on Sept. 30, 1972. In addition to his wife, he is survived by sons, Scott Bell and Franklin T. (MeOsha) Bell, Fort Worth, Texas; stepchildren, Tina Bower, New London, Mo., Tami (Steve) Schmidt, Milan, Tony Bower, Suffolk, Va., and Frank T. (Lisa) Bower, Aledo; 10 grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; a sister, Ruth French, Savanna; a brother, Wilmer (Marge) Bell, Grand Rapids, Mich.; sister-in-law, Nancy Bell, Anaheim, Calif.; and many wonderful nieces and nephews.



20's Era Cars Needed

On Sunday August 23, 2015 there will be a vintage football game at 2 p.m. at Douglas Park in Rock Island. The Quad Cities had two profession football teams. The game, sponsored by the Parks & Recreation Dept., will be between the Rock Island Independents and the Moline Universal Tractors (The Muts). It will be played using 20's rules and equipment. The Rock Island Independents were Universal Tractors was the first opponent of the Chicago

Gypsy Coeds Ride the Silver Streak is an exhibition about a 1926 Model T and a changing group of girls around 20 years of age who drove it around the United States and into Canada and Mexico each summer between 1934 and 1942. One of the girls started a correspondence with Henry Ford, who provided letters of introduction for them and met them more than once, a relationship that is well documented in the Benson Ford Research Center files. The owners painted the car silver and it was "Lizzie labeled" each year. The current owner of the car, the son of one of the coeds, is writing a book about the "Silver Streak" and the girls; it will be published by the time the exhibition opens on October 16, 2015. You can visit his extensive website, <http://gypsycoeds.com/>, for more information. This is a great human interest story that deserves even more attention than we can give it. The exhibit runs through January 17, 2016.



1919 Utility Car *by John Nikodym*

This 1919 Velie model 38 Utility Car was purchased new by Augustus Eustis, Isle Au Haut, Maine. For a number of years it was the only auto on the island and was used to carry mail and passengers to the Point Lookout Club.

Don McFarland, Sedgwick, ME, purchased the car in 1960 and removed it from the island via barge. The car was painted gray and, to an extent, showed its half-century of age but was intact and original.

McFarland restored the Velie, painting it maroon with black fenders. In 1985 he sold the car to Randy Hodsdon, Hermon, ME.

Jolyon Hofsted, Shady, NY, purchased the car in about 1989 and again restored the car, now painting it dark green with black fenders. A connecting rod had gone out the side of the crankcase so a replacement rod was found and a patch placed over the hole in the side of the crankcase. In June 1995 Doug James, Woodstock, NY, purchased the Velie. Doug purchased the car for sentimental reasons since he is a grandson of Charles Deere Velie. Doug had the car sorted out mechanically by a local mechanic, then put it up on blocks until this year when he decided it was time for the Velie to have a new custodian.

I agreed to purchase the car from Doug and made plans to pick it up on my way to the Willys-Overland-Knight Registry International meet in North Conway, NH, in June. The Velie had not been run for 15 years so I brought along spare parts including the carburetor and vacuum tank off of my running model 38 touring car because I intended to drive the car on the tours at the meet, even though it was not a car recognized by that club. It was a pleasure to meet Doug and learn more about his Velie family connection. He has promised to provide more information to the Velie Registry on the Charles Deere Velie Family.

After arriving in New Hampshire with the Velie I was able to get it running. I did have to use the carburetor and vacuum tank that I had brought from home because both of these parts needed cleaning and rebuilt. The floats in both had leaks. After driving the car about 70 miles the engine began knocking very loud so I shut it down and had it hauled back to my trailer before more damage was done to the engine. After arriving home I removed the pan and found that number 3 connecting rod bearing had failed and bits of the bearing were found all over the bottom end of the engine. I had a useable old bearing so installed it and now have the engine running once again. Luckily the connecting rod and crankshaft were not hurt.

I found out that the "Blossoms at Butterworth" event was going on in Moline on Sunday June, 28th, the day that we would be traveling through Moline on the way back to Nebraska. This is an annual event at the Deere-Wiman House, Butterworth Center,

and Rock Island County Historical Society. Included at this event is a car show by the Mississippi Valley Region of AACA. What great timing to be able to display the Velie in Moline where it was built 96 years ago.

We have very little information on the details of the Velie Utility Car. The only original documentation that I have found is the magazine ad that is shown on the following page. The Utility Car does not show up in any of the standard sales brochures. It is not known if the body was built by Velie or some other body builder. The front seats appear to be the same as a four-passenger roadster with a aisle between two separate seats for access to the rear. The rear section is all wood construction with a removable double seat. This car matches the description in the magazine ad but the illustrations in the ad do not match the car exactly. Mr. Hofsted made several minor modifications to the car when restoring it including adding caning to the side of the rear section that would not have been there originally.
